Quick rules: Years 3 & 4 (Fliers)

- There should be 4 players on court with 6 in a team. A squad is made up of a maximum of 3 teams
- Teams should be mixed with minimum of 50/50 girls & boys
- 2.43m (8ft) netball post
- · No formal positions coloured bibs should be used to distinguish the teams
- Pass the ball with in approx. 4 seconds
- Players must stand still with the ball
- If a team wins a game, they score points for their squad the total squad score will be the culmination of all teams scores & the squad with the highest score will win.

Health and safety

- Ensure there is sufficient space around the court.
- Check there are no hazards on or around the court.
- · Check posts are stable and if needed the base of the post weighted.

Think inclusively STEP

Space:	Some players have a small zone to play within.
Task:	Can employ flexible rules; for example, longer time in possession before a pass.
Equipment:	Could use a colour contrast ball for students with a visual impairment. A softer ball could also be considered.
	The post could also be lowered or replaced with a target.
People:	Group children based on their stage of development and encourage them to play against other groups at a similar stage.



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

Quick rules: Years 5 & 6 (Stingers)

- There should be 5 players on court with 7 9 in a team. A squad is made up of maximum of 3 teams.
- Teams should be mixed with a maximum of 3 boys in a team (maximum of 2 on court).
- Players must rotate position after each quarter (or half if games are split into halves). Whilst off court, there is a list of role options, all of which are related to the Bee Netball Beeliefs.
- Players must pass or shoot within 4 seconds.

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


